NORTH GERMAN CONFEDERATION

1866 - 1871

A common postal system was launched for the North German Confederation in 1868. A major difficulty which had to be overcome was that within the Confederation, three different monetary systems were in use.

- Northern District: 30 Groschen = 1 Thaler
- Southern District: 60 Kreuzer = 1 Gulden
- Hamburg: 16 Schillings = 1 Mark

To accommodate for these differences, three separate postal groups were created, and stamps were printed in the three different currencies.

Stamps of the North German Confederation were replaced, with those of the German Empire in January, 1972, however the currency of the Empire wasn't harmonized until 1875, then Germany moved to: 100 Pfennigs = 1 Mark.
